AfRU Chancellor Calls on Graduates to Embrace Education as a Tool for Societal Transformation



He drew attention to the low rate of tertiary education in Sub-Saharan Africa only 6% and challenged Christians to value education, occupy leadership spaces, and influence culture for God.

Using Uganda's Muslim

community as a case study, Rev. Kasirivu illustrated how deliberate investment in education led to significant growth in leadership and business. "They decided to change their story through education," he noted. Rev. Peter J. Kasirivu (Chancellor), urged graduates to see education not just as a personal achievement but as a divine tool to transform society.
Under the theme "The Power of Education in Changing Society", Rev. Kasirivu emphasized the lasting impact of education, quoting global icons like Nelson

Mandela andMalcolm X.

"Education is the most powerful weapon which you can use to change the world," he said, echoing Mandela's famous words.

The Chancellor highlighted education's role in reducing poverty, promoting health,

and spurring national

He also called for respect for the teaching profession and celebrated AfRU's newly established School of Education. "Teachers are nation builders. If we want to shape the future, we must shape the educators," he said.

The Chancellor concluded by urging graduates to be culture-changers, influence systems with Godly values, and be "wise as serpents and harmless as doves" in a world that may not always embrace open faith.

"You don't need a pulpit to preach. Let your life be the sermon," he said



Bishop Simon Peter Emiau Urges Graduates to Embrace Stewardship Amidst Uganda's Challenges and Opportunities

In thought-provoking sermon, Bishop Simon Peter Emiau delivered a timely message centered on resilience, opportunity, and responsible leadership during times of challenges at the recent AFRU-graduation ceremony. His address, titled "Every Beginning Marks an End", touched on Uganda's current socio-political challenges, while offering a hopeful outlook on the nation's future—particularly through the lens of education.

Speaking to a congregation of graduates and dignitaries, Bishop Simon Peter Emiau emphasized that while Uganda grapples with corruption, greed, land grabbing, unemployment, and political unrest, it is also a land brimming with opportunity. "Amidst all these negative things, there are great opportunities," he said. "Education helps us not only look at one side of the coin."

The sermon was a call to action an invitation to see beyond hardship, embrace opportunity, and build a better Uganda through knowledge, responsibility, and vision.

Vice Chancellor Dr. Vincent Byamukama welcomed dignitaries and guests with a message grounded in faith, gratitude, and purpose. He reminded graduates that their education is not simply for personal advancement, but a sacred calling to serve others.
"You are uniquely positioned to be the change-makers Africa needs," Dr. Byamukama said. "Let your light shine, and may your work bring glory to God and trans-

formation to our continent." The Vice Chancellor also highlighted major achievements for the university, including:

- Award of the University Charter in March 2024.
- Accreditation of the university's first PhD in Leadership and three new master's programs.
- A leap in academic output with 35 research publications, ranking AfRU #62 in Sub-Saharan Africa.
- Groundbreaking for a new School of Film, Media, and Creative Arts, backed by a \$500,000 grant.
- Significant ICT upgrades, infrastructure development, and expanded community outreach across Uganda.

He paid special tribute to Cornerstone Church West Los Angeles for their decade-long partnership, which has led to scholarships, improved hostels, vocational training spaces, and lasting impact on student lives.





Closing with a biblical charge from 1 Samuel 7:12, Dr. Byamukama declared, "Thus far the Lord has helped us." He called on graduates to serve with excellence, compassion, and courage, responding to Africa's challenges with faith and leadership.

The ceremony was filled with cheers and applause as students walked across the stage, shaking hands with faculty and receiving their diplomas.
